European Tennis Trophy: Russia Under Pressure in Race to Defend Titles

In what promises to be the closest race for some years, defending champions Russia face tough competition from Germany, Spain and France as they seek to become only the second nation to win the



overall **European Tennis Trophy presented by Lindström** - an annual accolade recognising the achievements of Tennis Europe member nations in various fields of the sport - on four consecutive occasions.

Russia's lead over second-placed Spain for the crucial **Professional Tennis Trophy** is a mere 375 points, compared to 1008 at this time in 2007. International team competitions are likely to be crucial to the final outcome, with the nations due to meet in the final of the Fed Cup by BNP Paribas in September. Both teams will also feature in the semi finals of the Davis Cup by BNP Paribas.

Russia has dominated the **Junior Tennis Trophy** in recent years and looks set to defend its title once again, having earned almost twice as many points as nearest rivals France in the first half of the season. Ukraine has achieved the most radical improvement so far in 2008, standing in third place having finished last season ranked #23 in Europe. Belgium, Great Britain and Hungary are also on course to finish in the top ten, halving their 2007 rankings.

Germany is virtually assured of retaining the **Senior Tennis Trophy**, having dominated the major European Championships to have been played so far this season to such an extent that they have almost three times as many points as second placed Austria, who are well positioned to usurp last year's runners-up, Italy.

Meanwhile, the Netherlands' dominance at the World Team Cup puts them in good stead to retain the **Wheelchair Tennis Trophy**, with a 300 point lead over second placed Sweden, aiming for their best ever finish in the category.

The Overall point standings forecast significant improvements for Israel, Serbia and Ukraine, while Belgium and Croatia are in danger of slipping from the top ten. Great changes can be expected during the second half of the season, with extra points available at the forthcoming Olympic and Paralympic Games.

The first Trophy Race update includes all points earned by nations in events until the end of June 2008, including ATP Tour and Sony Ericsson WTA Race Points. Rankings that use a rollover 52-week system are not counted at this stage.

The final European Tennis Trophy by Lindström standings for 2008 will be announced in December.

European Beach Tennis Championships



Home players swept the titles at the European Beach Tennis Championships, which were held from the 31st July-3rd August in Riccione, Italy. The event saw participation from players from 11 nations, with some well-

known tennis names trying their hand at the sport for the first time on the new ITF Beach Tennis Circuit.

The men's event came to an unfortunate conclusion, with the disqualification of Alan Maldini. Playing with co-world #1 Luca Meliconi, Maldini threw his bat in anger following the loss of a point early in the second set, leaving the referee with no choice but to default the team after it unintentionally struck a spectator. The title went to Marco Garavini and Paolo Tazzari, who were winning 6-4 1-1 at the time. The costly mistake means that Garavini and Tazzari will usurp their compatriots as world #1s when the new ITF Beach Tennis Tour rankings are released.

Two of the three players currently sharing the women's world #1 spot teamed to claim the women's doubles trophy, as Simona Briganti and Rossella Stefanelli swept to the title without the loss of a set. In the semi finals, the pair overcame third seeded Belarussians Olga Barabanschikova and 18-time Grand Slam doubles champion Natasha Zvereva 6-2 6-3, before overcoming compatriots Franca Bruschi and Laura Olivieri in the final.

Olivieri made up for disappointment in the women's event by teaming with Cristian Berardi to win the mixed doubles. The pair was a class above their rivals, losing just seven games in three matches on their way to their second European title, having both featured on the winning Italian team of 2007.

Hosted by the Italian Tennis Federation, the second annual European Beach Tennis Championships featured a revised format, with mens, womens and mixed doubles events held in an open age category. Open to players from all Tennis Europe member nations, teams from Belarus, Belgium, Bulgaria, Cyprus, Czech Republic, Germany, Italy, Netherlands, Russia, San Marino and Slovenia travelled to Riccione.

Tennis Europe recently extended its partnership with HEAD to include the Beach Tennis categories, with the company providing balls and equipment for the event.

The ITF Beach Tennis Tour now moves on to Bibione in Italy, before making its first visits to Spain in September.

European Junior Championships



The last week of July saw Europe's top junior players fighting for honours at the Tennis Europe Junior Tour's most prestigious event, the European Junior Championships. The 33rd edition of the event was staged at three venues across the continent, split by age group.

The youngest of Europe's elite players travelled to Pilsen, Czech Republic, where fourteenth seed Moos Sporken became the first ever Dutch winner of the 14 & Under boys' event, eventually winning a marathon final match 36 62 75 over Martins Podzus of Latvia. Sporken upset higher ranked opposition in his last four matches to win his third event of the year, following on from Category 1 titles in Leeuwarden and Maia, and shot to the top spot of the Tennis Europe Junior Tour's 14 & under rankings for the first time as a result of his victory.

In the girls' event, Petra Uberalova of the Slovak Republic won her second big title in a month to become the first Slovakian 14 & under champion. Having survived a marathon 37-game semi final, the sixth seed stepped up a gear in the final to beat former Tennis Europe Junior Tour #1 Daria Gavrilova for the title. Uberalova rose to third in Europe following her win, whilst Gavrilova reclaimed the top spot that she has held for much of the year from compatriot Yulia Putintseva (RUS). To underline their dominance, Gavrilova and Putintseva paired up to take the girls doubles title, recovering from the brink of defeat to storm through a third set tie break 26 76(3) 10-1

against Belarussia's Ilona Kremen and Aliaksandra Sasnovich.

The boys' doubles event went to third seeds Kevin Kaczynski and Jannis Kahlke of Germany. The pair lost the first set they played in the tournament but never looked back, cruising to a comfortable win over Ivan Levar and Filip Veger of Croatia in the final.

The 16 & Under event was staged at the Russian Tennis Federation's National Training Centre in Moscow for a second year, where Henri Laaksonen became just the second Finnish player ever to win a European Junior Championships title, sweeping to a comprehensive 62 62 win over fourth seeded German Dominik Schulz in the decisive match.

Emerging from an upset-strewn top half of the draw, unseeded Laaksonen scored his fifth upset win in six matches to win the Tennis Europe Junior Tour flagship event, and rose from the relatively lowly position of #288 to just outside the top ten as a result of his win.

Timea Babos of Hungary defeated Italy's Martina Trevisan for the girls' title, her first on the Tennis Europe Junior Tour since May of last year. Babos, a 14 & Under top ten regular in the past couple of years, ran away with the match after securing a tight first set 75 61.

Unseeded Poles Pavla Kania and Magda Linette upset Russia's Yana Buchina and Anna-Arina Marienko 57

63 (10-8) for the girls' doubles title, whilst Germany's Kevin Krawietz became the only player in any age category to defend a title in 2008, this time teaming with Dominik Schults to edge Spain's Carlos Boluda and Javier Martí 46 63 (10-8) to take the boys doubles for a second year.

In Bad Hofgastein, Austria, third seeded Guillaume Rufin became the second French player in three years to lift the European Junior Championships title, with a 64 64 win over top seeded Finn Henri Kontinen. Rufin was in fine form throughout the rain-affected week in Bad Hofgastein (AUT), winning his six matches without the loss of a set, and breaks into the top ten of the ITF Junior Rankings as a result of his win, which followed a rich vein of summer form in which he also won two grass court titles on the circuit.

Elena Bogdan of Romania prevented an all-French celebration as she beat Cindy Chala 64 62 to win the girls' title. Bogdan also won the tournament without the loss of a set, and becomes the first Romanian winner of the event in eighteen years, rising to a career high of fifth in the world as a result.

Eleventh seeds Richard Hampel and Radim Urbanek continued the Czech Republic's domination of the boys doubles event, beating Valdimir Kruk and Andrei Vasilevski (BLR) for a seventh Czech win from the last thirteen editions. The girls' doubles title went to fourth seeds Richel Hogenkamp and Lesley Kerkhove. The Dutch pair had survived a succession of nailbiting finishes to reach the final, but had less trouble against the Spanish pair of Leticia Costas and Yera Campos-Molina, winning 75 63.

Tennis Europe Chief Executive Officer Olli Mäenpää commented "Once again the European Championships has proven to be the highlight of the Tennis Europe Junior Tour, with some inspired performances from our most promising players. I'd like to thank all three venues and their corresponding national federations for their work in organising the event, and also our sponsor HEAD for their generous contributions to the Championships."

Tennis Europe Nations Challenge by HEAD



A total of 60 national teams took part in the second annual European junior team competition for Under 12s, the Tennis Europe Nations Challenge by HEAD recently. Four regional qualifying zones were staged for both boys and girls over the weekend of July 24th-27th, with the top eight

teams progressing to the final rounds in early August.

In the girls event, Ukraine won the championships for the first time, coming from behind to score a 2-1 victory over France at the finals in Agaccio.

French #3 Alizee Michaud put the home team in front with a 64 64 win over Viktoriya Lushkova before the visitors struck back with a 75 61 win for Olexandra Korashvili over Estelle Cascino to level the tie.

The deciding doubles match went the full distance, with Ukraine's singles players finally gaining the upper hand in the final set over Cascino and Laura Tanfin, eventually marching to a 62 26 60 win to leave France as the defeated finalists in both editions of the girls competition so far.

Host nation Italy claimed the boys title for the first time after fighting past Croatia in the final. The Italians had lost just one match in their three ties prior to the final but had to work hard for the win. Riccardo Chessari beat Domagoj Biljesko to give the Italians the lead after the first match, but Borna Coric struck back to upset Italian #1 Gianluigi Quinzi - who with four Tennis Europe Junior Tour 14 & under titles under his belt already this year was the most accomplished of the young players in the tournament - in straight sets to level the tie.

The Italian duo returned to the court for the doubles against Coric and Filip Kraljevic and after gaining the upper hand in a tight first set, romped to a 75 61 win which made up for the disappointment of losing the 2007 final, before embarking on some wild celebrations in front of their home supporters.



"This second edition of the Tennis Europe Nations Challenge by HEAD and the 2008 Junior Championships were extremely successful both as events and for HEAD as a sponsor," said Robert Marte, Executive Vice President of the company's racquet sports division. European Summer Cups

Europe's junior outdoor team championships – collectively known as the European Summer Cups – are over for another year, following the conclusion of the Under 16 and Under 18 events in early August. 105 national teams took part in the competition across the two age groups, which were divided into four qualifying groups, from which the top two performing teams advanced to the finals.

In Leysin, Switzerland, Poland beat Great Britain in a close final to capture the girls' 16 & under Helvetie Cup for the second time in four years. The two team split singles victories as Paula Kania put the third-seeded Poles ahead, thanks to a straight sets win over Heather Watson. Tara Moore struck back for the Brits in similar style, losing just five games to Magda Linette to take the tie to a decisive doubles rubber.

Having won the European Junior Championships doubles title together just ten days prior, the confident Poles overcame a second set stutter to clinch the title 63 06 64.

In the 16 & Under boys' event, Russia took the Borotra Cup trophy for the first time in the 33-year history of the event, coming from behind to beat Hungary 2-1 in Le Touquet, France. Marton Fucsovics edged Robert Muzsievich 36 75 64 to put the top-seeded Hungarians in front only to see the lead cancelled out in a match between two former Tennis Europe Junior Tour #1s, which saw Mikhail Biryukov beat Mate Zsiga 63 63. The four players returned to the court for the deciding doubles match, which the Russian pair took 64 63.

The 16 & under European Summer Cups also serve as the regional qualifying competition for the all-important Junior Davis Cup and Junior Fed Cup by BNP Paribas events. In addition to the winners and runners-up, the next four best-performing teams - Hungary, Serbia, Belarus and Netherlands (girls), and Sweden, Latvia, Great Britain and Romania (boys) - all secured berths at the finals in Mexico in September.

The girls 18 & under finals in Granville, France, had a familiar outcome, as Russia won the Soisbault/Reina Cup for a fourth consecutive year, with a comprehensive win over unseeded Slovak Republic.

Ksenia Pervak and Anastasia Pivovarova wasted no time in recording straight set wins over Lenka Jurikova and Klaudia Boczova respectively to settle the tie at the end of singles action, before Pervak returned to

the court alongside Ksenia Lykina to complete a 3-0 win. With the win, Russia equalled the previous longest winning streak in the events' history, when Spain held the title from 1988-1991.

Slovenia caused a surprise at the boys 18 & under Galea/Valerio Cup to win the event for the first time in its history. The Slovene team swept to a 2-0 win over Germany on the final day of action in Verona, Italy. Slovene #3 Tomislav Ternar scored the first point for his side with a comprehensive win over Ralph Regus before Blaz Rola put the championship out of reach of the Germans with a 64 76(3) win over Cedric-Marcel Stebe.

Seniors Tennis Round-Up

The 2008 **European Seniors Individual Championships** were brought to a conclusion recently, with the staging of the 35 & Over event in Rottach-Weissach, Germany from 24th-27th July.

Unseeded players Patricia Markova-Rogulski of the Slovak Republic and Svetlana Komleva of Moldova emerged from an upset-strewn women's draws to contest the final. Rogulski had looked comfortable in her three previous wins, which included victories over top seed Isabelle Gemmel and fourth seed Anke Wurst, but was able to put up little opposition to her opponent Komleva, who conceded just three games to win her first European Seniors title.

Fifth seed Karsten Braasch came through a tough men's draw to take the title. Having breezed through the first few rounds, the former ATP Tour top 40 regular struggled past sixth seeded compatriot Sascha Petratschek 60 36 64 in the semi finals, before eventually clinching a similarly tight win against Czech Republic's Radovan Kuchynka 75 36 63 in the final.

Meanwhile, the **European Seniors Club Championships** roll on, with the Mens 65s being the latest event to be completed. Twelve teams travelled to Berlin to take part in the event from 6-11 July, which saw Palermo defend their title, beating the home town's Rot-Weiss Club in the final for a second consecutive year.

Austria's TC Pasching beat Karlsdorf of Germany into third place.

South East Training Camp/12&U Development Championships

The fifth edition of the ITF/Tennis Europe South East Regional Training Camp for players aged 12 & under was held in Ankara, Turkey recently under the supervision of ITF expert Ales Filipcic (SLO). The camp, which ran from 2nd to 7th July, attracted thirty-four players and nine coaches from the Balkan and Caucasus region (Bosnia and Herzegovina, FYR of Macedonia, Bulgaria, Albania, Azerbaijan, Georgia, Serbia and Turkey).

During the five-day camp players had the opportunity to improve their tactical, technical and fitness skills with special attention on developing successful playing patterns in all game situations suitable for their age, individual characteristics and game style.

For the first time this year, players had the additional opportunity to take part in the International 12 & Under Development Championships, which took place at the Ankara Tennis Club upon completion of the training camp.

The Championships were played in a multiple round-robin competition format. The best four boys and girls from qualifying rounds played against each other in order to determine the winner.

Players from Bulgaria were to dominate the Championships. In the girls' event, Terziiska Djulia was in control from the very beginning. In the final match she breezed to victory against Dajana Radanovic (SRB) 60 62.

After winning the qualifying rounds and overcoming their semi final opponents, Bulgarians Gabriel Donev and Andrei Alawi met in the final. Andrei imposed himself from very beginning of the match and won easily in two sets 62 61.

Birol Vural, host nation representative and organiser of the South East Regional Training Camp was happy with the outcome of the event, commenting: "Bringing together players from eight different countries creates the opportunity to practice and compete with players of different backgrounds and playing levels. It was especially important for our Turkish players who don't have enough opportunities to compare their level with the most promising players from other European coun-



tries. At the same time the Camp is an excellent opportunity for our coaches to see the level of the promising players from some eastern European countries. The Turkish Tennis Federation is thankful to the ITF and Tennis Europe for getting the chance to organize this important development event in Turkey."

Beyond the Baseline...

Top Serbs **Ana Ivanovic** and **Jelena Jankovic** are the first two players to secure singles berths at the season-ending Sony Ericsson WTA Tour Championships in Qatar in November. Meanwhile, **Roger Federer**, **Rafael Nadal** and **Novak Djokovic** have been confirmed for the ATPs corresponding event, in Shanghai.

The **International Tennis Federation** has announced the Davis and Fed Cup schedules for 2009, with the main change being the shifting of the Fed Cup finals to early November, meaning it will once again close the curtain on the women's tennis season.

The 2009 **Fed Cup by BNP Paribas** dates are as follows:

February 7-8: World Group & World Group II Round 1
 April 25-26: World Group Semifinals and Playoffs
 November 7-8: World Group Final

The 2009 **Davis Cup by BNP Paribas** dates are as follows:

March 6-8: World Group First Round
 July 10-12: World Group Quarterfinals
 September 18-20: World Group Semifinals
 December 4-6: World Group Final

Swiss Tennis has signed a three-year sponsorship deal with security firm Securitas.

The **WTA** has decided to suspend their trial of on-court coaching, with an announcement that there will be no changes to the current rules prohibiting the practice expected at the end of the year.

A relapse of the mononucleosis that kept **Mario Ancic** out of the game for several months at the end of last year has forced the Croatian to withdraw from the US Open for the second year running.

Maria Sharapova is also looking at an extended break following further problems with her long-running shoulder injury.

Record prize money is on offer at the **US Open** later this month, with a pool fund of \$20.6 million available, a 7% increase on 2007. The total payout could potentially exceed \$23.2 million, with bonus cash available for the top-three finishers in the recent US Open series. Dinara Safina has already clinched pole position in the women's standings, with Rafael Nadal and Andy Murray joint #1s in the men's.

European players to have received wild cards into the years final Grand Slam are Severine Bremond of France (main draw) and 2007 junior champion Kristina Kucova of Slovak Republic (qualifying), with the men's recipients yet to be announced.

The **Sony Ericsson WTA Tour** has appointed former Australian Open Deputy Tournament Director Peter Johnston to oversee the Tour's player and tournament relations and competitions operations.

At a meeting during the Beijing Olympics, the **International Tennis Federation's** Board of Directors ratified the 2009 World Anti-Doping Code on behalf of tennis' anti-doping program. Changes to the code include greater flexibility in determining sanctions, and mandatory provisional suspensions in order to reduce the time that players accused of doping offences are in competition.

Jelena Jankovic became the 18th world #1 in the history of women's professional tennis on August 11th, just one week before Rafael Nadal usurps Roger Federer at the summit of the men's list to become the 24th men's world #1, and third from Spain.

European Rankings

Jelena Jankovic this month becomes the second Serb player to top the European rankings in successive months, deposing compatriot Ana Ivanovic for the honour. A good showing at the Olympic Games or the forthcoming US Open for either of the pair, or Russia's Svetlana Kuznetsova could secure the top spot for the rest of the year.

Dinara Safina's ten match win streak on the hard courts of Los Angeles and Montreal sees her edge to a career high of #5. Safina now has a tour win/loss record of 28/3 since the start of the European clay season and has been the player to beat since the retirement of former #1 Justine Henin.

In the men's list, Rafael Nadal's three-year march to the summit of both the European and world rankings is almost complete. The Spaniard will depose Roger Federer before the US Open thanks to a continuation of his Wimbledon form on the North American hardcourts. Nadal would be the first Spaniard since Juan Carlos Ferrero in 2004 to be the top-ranked European.

A run to the Stuttgart final and a place in the Toronto quarter finals from Richard Gasquet was enough to re-establish the Frenchmans as the top ten's fourth player aged 22 and under.
