Italy dominated the 2001 European Team Championships.

In the Women's competition played in the beautiful Unesco City of Cesky Krumlov a young Italian

team including the 1996 winner of the European Junior Masters A. Serra-Zanetti, defended their title. In a dramatic final, the girls from Italy beat great fighting outsiders from Poland.

FED CUP FINAL 2001

European teams dominated the 2001 Fed Cup, as Belgium romped to a decisive victory in the finals at Madrid. The tournament, the first to played at the impressive IFEMA complex on indoor clay courts boasted 7 of the top 8 European players available for selection, and a total of 8 former European junior champions.

Despite the withdrawal of the US team, the event proved to be a great success with some hotly contested ties and stunning performances.

Fulfilling the promise shown on the tour throughout the year, Grand Slam finalists Kim Clijsters and Justine Henin led Belgium to a victory that included wins over Australia, Germany, Spain and Russia. The final victory was a confident one, as both players, who have been teaming for international titles since they won the European Under 14 doubles in 1996, gave an assured display of power tennis to crush their Russian counterparts, Elena Dementieva and Nadia Petrova in straight sets.

EUROPEAN WOMEN'S TEAM CHAMPIONSHIPS

Champions Division

Due to a late withdrawal of the Yugoslavian team caused by injuries the format in the Champions Division had to be modified at the last minute. Despite this change the organisers in Cesky Krumlov

(CZE) welcomed ten top 200 players, which guaranteed a high level of play.

The number three seeded Team from Italy including Valentina Sassi, Nathalie Vierin, Antonella Serra Zanetti and the Captain Simone Sbardellati decided the Final against a great performing Polish team (Katarzyna Straczy, Anna Zarska, Joanna Sakowicz).

The young and ambitious team from Poland which defeated the number two seeded team from Czech Republic in the first round and in the semi-finals a strong British team was with no doubt the surprise of the week. Especially Sakowicz demonstrated her talent,

very promising for a successful career.

First Division Group One

Espinho, marvellous seaside town close to Porto (POR) hosted the first division group one. In that division the team from Croatia was promoted to the 2002 Champions Division. In a difficult group consisting of four teams they secured in the last minute their promotion.

First Division Group Two

In group two, played in Turkey, the local team beat in a dramatic Final their opponent from Ukraine. Turkey will play next year for the first time in the history of this competition in the Champions Division.

THE INTERVIEW WITH NICK BROWN

Nick Brown is a former Tennis Pro. He works since 1997 as Captain of the British FED CUP Team, European Women's team Championships team as well as the Maureen Connolly team. When not travelling with "the Team Great Britain" he is coaching a squad of girls at the All England Club.

Which importance does the European Women's Team Championships have for you and your team?

For the British team it is a very valuable competition as it gives the young players the chance to gain experience for future tasks in Fed Cup. Especially this year where all the matches were so close the players could benefit very much. There has not been one easy match during the past five days.

How important are team competitions in tennis in your point of view?

It is extremely important, as the players have not a lot of opportuni-



ties to play in this special environment. It can also have a big influence on someone's career. I mean that the players can win a lot of confidence in such competitions and based on that the player can grow and go to the next and bigger tasks. A very good example is Elena Baltacha. She played a very good Team Championships last year and that was really the first step for a good 2001 season, which included the Semi-Final of the junior Wimbledon tournament.

British Women's Tennis has not been producing any top women

player in the past years, where do you see the problem?

There are three problem areas. The first problem is the Talent ID, the second problem is the quantity of talented players and the third problem is the competitiveness of the players. It is really difficult to find young players, who have the competitiveness, the desire and the athletic to play tennis.

A further problem is that we have too few international domestic tournaments. That means that the players have to travel abroad in order to gain international experience, which is very difficult due to their school commitments.

Is there a chance that we are going to see soon some British Women players surviving the first week of Wimbledon?

It also depends on the draw but I believe that Elena Baltacha or Anne Keothanvong, who also played here in the Czech Republic, have the potential to go very far within the next three years.

(continuing from page 1) Clijsters was in particularly dominating form, winning the first set in a mere fourteen minutes, and conceding only four games overall to Dementieva.

The highlight of the tournament was Henin's semi final win over Conchita Martinez, who was returning to the game after a four-month injury layoff. In front of a delighted crowd, for a set and a half, the Spaniard played arguably her finest tennis of the season, but was unable to put away the Wimbledon finalist. Henin fought back brilliantly to snatch victory from a 5-1 deficit in the third set, saving a match point along the way, and

delighting the strong Belgian contingent who had travelled to Madrid to give vociferous support throughout the week.

Other young talents to impress included current European 16 and under champion, Czech Petra Cetkovska, and Martina Muller for Germany, both making their debut in the competition. For the old guard, Nathalie Tauziat was present in her 15th Fed Cup as a doubles force after her retirement from tour singles the previous week. The French team, which also boasted Amelie Mauresmo and Sandrine Testud included three of the top 5 Europeans selected. Arantxa Sanchez-Vicario teamed

with Martinez to maintain the Spanish record of only having failed to qualify for the semi finals once since 1989.

With a first win from a first final, the Belgians can look forward to a promising future in the competition, their success prompting comparisons to the young Spanish side that emerged at the end of the 1980's and went on to become the dominant European force over the next decade. At the end of another great year for tennis, the addition four weeks later of the Davis Cup by the French team in Australia, means European teams hold both of the ITF's premier team trophies.

EUROPEAN MEN'S TEAM CHAMPIONSHIPS

Champions Division

For the fourth time the Champions Division of the European Men's Team Championships returned to the wonderful spa city of Montecatini.

The Italian team lead by Davis Cup Captain Corrado Barazzutti came to Montecatini with the clear intention to win the competition.

On their way to the final the Italian team eliminated Bulgaria, which played with one of the most promising youngsters on the tour, Todor Enev. In the semi-finals the Italian Team beat last year's Champion Czech Republic. In the final the local heroes defeated a strong Greek team in front of almost 2'000 spectators.

In the decisive play-off ties Sweden beat Bulgaria and Poland beat Belgium. The Scandinavian team managed to secure their place in the Champions Division thanks to their victory in doubles. In the other tie, Belgium coached by former Top 100 player Johan Van Herck was relegated to the 1st Division just after one year in the Champions Division.

First Division Group One

As in the Women's competition Espinho was the host of the first division group one. This group was extremely strong.

In the final Portugal was playing against the favourites from Spain. But Marc Lopez (ESP), who reached this summer the Semi-Finals in Stuttgart, was not able to

secure a victory over the experienced Portuguese player Emanuel Couto. In the other Singles Bernard Mota (POR) defeated Didac Perez (ESP). After an absence of four years, Portugal will play next year again in the Champions Division.

First Division Group two

The ENKA Club Istanbul was the host of this group. As in group one also here the field of players was rather strong. Great Britain with its Captain Roger Taylor came to Istanbul with the clear aim to win the competition and to go straight back to the Champions Division. Without losing one match they secured themselves a place in the 2002 Champions Division.

The most number of the titles (23) went to Czech girls, with Germans and French coming next (14 titles each).	Tatiana Garbin (ITA) was the highest ranked player (51) to win the title.
Celine Beigbeder (FRA) won the most number of singles titles (5) in 2001. Her ranking improved from 675 (1 January) to 102 (3 December); 26 players won at least two singles events this year.	Gabriela Navratilova (CZE) won an amazing number of 8 doubles titles; the most successful team comprised the twins Daniella and Sandra Klemenschitz (AUT) that secured 6 doubles titles.
The singles finals resulted in shocking “double bagels” (60 60) twice.	Jacqueline Froehlich (GER) proceeded to win Athens 2 event while having no points on Sanex WTA ranking.
28 qualifiers that went on to win the singles title proved the depth of the women's field.	First seeds lived up to the expectations and won the titles at 19 events.

JUNIOR GENERAL MEETING

The Junior General Meeting took place in Vilamoura, Portugal on November 23-25. Approximately forty delegates from twenty-one nations attended it, including several Tournament Organisers of 12/14/16& Under Events.

The meeting consisted of two parts. An Open Forum on Friday afternoon and a Plenary Session which took place during the whole Saturday.

Open Forum

As a start, Olli Mäenpää, the Managing Director, External Affairs presented "Promotional Statistics of the European Junior Tours". It was explained to the attendants how the information like media coverage, financial position, home-pages, etc. that Tennis Europe currently collects from the tournaments is being processed in order to gain interest among potential sponsors, promote the Tours, in-

crease the interaction between the National Associations and improve the quality. He also informed the delegates that net advertising, which up to now had not been permitted according to the Rules of Tennis, will be allowed from the beginning of next year and that Tennis Europe reserves exclusively all the rights regarding net banners and naming rights of the Tour from 2002 onwards for a potential title sponsor. JUNIOR GENERAL MEETING

The main topic during the second part of the Open Forum was the Organisation of a Tournament part of the European Junior Tours 12/14/16 & Under. Four Tournament Directors shared with the public their experiences before, during and after their own events take place. The speakers were:

To finish this part of the meeting, Sven Harke from the German Ten-

nis Federation presented "Coordination Role of the National Association in a Junior Tournament". After a general overview of Junior Tennis in Germany, he explained that the Federation is basically a management center, which offers the tournaments organisational support, sponsoring & business partners and in some cases financial help.

Plenary Session

The Chairman, Balazs Taroczy opened the Plenary Session on Saturday morning referring to the most successful Junior Players and Competitions of the year 2001. Shortly after, the 2001 14/16 Tournaments' Rankings, the 2001 Tennis Europe Players of the Year, the 2002 12/14/16 &U Tour Calendars, the main rule changes and the 2001/2002 competition results and forecasts were presented and discussed with the participants. It was announced that

the No-Ad Scoring System will NOT be used in any Junior Competition during the year 2002, except in some team competitions being Qualifyings for the World Competitions as instructed by the ITF.

The plenary session continued with several presentations, as follows: José Costa, General Secretary of the Portuguese Tennis Federation, Luca Santilli, ITF/Tennis Europe Development Officer, Jackie Nesbitt, ITF Junior/Veterans Manager, Michael Brown from Beatwax Communications ("Junior Anti-Doping Campaign") and Anne Pankhurst, Coach Education Director at the Lawn Tennis Association (Child Protection).

2002 ITF/TENNIS EUROPE SPECIAL CHAMPIONSHIPS 14/16 & UNDER**DEVELOPMENT CHAMPIONSHIPS 14/16 & Under**

The 8th ITF/Tennis Europe Development Championships will be hosted this year for the second time in a row by the Tennis Associations of Lithuania (14U) and Bulgaria (16U) as follows:

The 14 & Under Championships will be held in Siauliai, Lithuania from 7 – 18 January.

The 16 & Under Championships will be held in Bulgaria, venue still to be announced from 15 - 25 April.

More than 120 players from 18 European nations are expected to participate in. The format of the nearly two weeks competition will be the feed-in system with a draw of 32 boys and 32 girls playing one single match every day. Those players who perform well will have the opportunity to be invited to be a member of an ITF/Tennis Europe Team 14/U and receive a Special Travel Grant (16/U) of 2000 US\$ to attend more junior tournaments.

SMALL STATES CHAMPIONSHIPS 14 & Under

The 3rd edition of the ITF/Tennis Europe Small States Championships, will be taking place in Limassol, Cyprus, from 6 – 13 April. Hosted by the Tennis Association of Cyprus for the second time in a row, the competition is reserved to the Small States in Europe such as Andorra, Cyprus, Iceland, Liechtenstein, Luxembourg, Malta, Monaco and San Marino.

For the second year a special invitation to participate will be forwarded to the National Associations of Albania and Azerbaijan.

The format of the nearly two weeks competition will be the feed-in system with more than 16 boys and 16 girls playing one single match every day. Those players who perform well will have the opportunity to be invited to be a member of an ITF/Tennis Europe Small States Team 14/U which will be touring in Europe during the summer.

CENTENARY CLUBS - TECHNICAL FORUM

At the beginning of November the Real Club de Tennis Barcelona-1899 and the Centenary Tennis Clubs association (CTC) organised the 1st forum for Tennis School Coaches at the marvellous RCTBarcelona.

The forum was focused on technical, organisational and social aspects that affect the tennis schools within the clubs.

During two days, experienced speakers like Miguel Crespo (ITF) gave their best in order to educate the representatives from various member clubs of the CTC

as well as the CT Barcelona-Teia, CT Vic, the Spanish Tennis Federation and the Catalan Tennis Federation.

One of the social objectives of the CTC is to promote activities that facilitate the exchange of experiences among the members of the centenary Clubs. After the Tennis School Directors Meeting that was held in Brussels in 1998, this was the second technical event that was organised by the CTC. This kind of forum should take place every two years and could be complemented by a symposium focusing on management and marketing in sports clubs.
