"IT IS GREAT TO DEFEND THE COLOURS OF YOUR CLUB"

At the occasion of the European Club Championships for Men, Tennis Europe News interviewed Albert Costa.

He started his professional career in 1993. Consistent performances on the Tour including wins in Dubai, Barcelona and Hamburg meant he rose to number nine in the world rankings in 1997.

More recently he beat Todd Martin to win the 1999 Estoril tournament before further successes at Gstaad and Kitzbuehel. He started 2000 as the highest ranked Spanish player.

He also made it to the quarterfinals of the French Open in 1995 and 2000 and is a regular member of the Spanish Davis Cup team.

As a junior he won the Spanish boys' championship and European under-18 title.

What does it mean to you to play a competition for your Club?

For me it is very important to be part of a team and to play team

competitions like the European Club Championships or the Davis Cup. I think it is really nice to defend the colours of your club or country. I also like all the emotions, which are coming up in such competitions.

You became dad some months ago, is that going to change something regarding your tennis carrier?

It changed my life and it is one of the most important things, which happened so far in my living. This fact will not change my tennis plans, as I will continue focusing on Tennis and try to play my best tennis. In the future I will play the same amount of weeks as before but I will make sure that my family will be as much as possible travelling with me.

In 1993 you were 18& Under European Junior Champion. What memories come-up when you look back at that time?

It was at that time my biggest success and I will never forget it. That victory was very important for me and gave me a lot of confidence, as it was the start of my professional carrier in that year.

Was it difficult for you to make the step from the Junior Game to the Professional Game?

It was very difficult to take the step from the Junior Tennis to the Professional Tennis. The atmosphere in the Professional Circuit was not as friendly anymore as in the Junior Tour. The good thing for me was that during my Junior period the competition was very big as there were players like Corretja, Moya, Martin, Norman, Johansson etc. and I had already during that time to fight for every point.

The Internationaux Féminins de la Vienne, biggest Women Individual Tennis Europe event in the annual calendar (\$75,000+H), has been held in Poitiers this year again at the Comité de Tennis de la Vienne site.

This event organised by a team of approximately 150 volunteers and under the direction of Daniel Poulain reached throughout the years the mature age and can be described as a reference even if the wish to make it better next year is clear in the mind of the organisers.

Although the players get hospitality in a very nice four stars hotel which is exceptional for this level of event, the club including the player's lounge will be renewed before the next edition. A special attention will also be brought to the sponsors in increasing the village's size in 2002 in order to let them welcoming their guests in a more private & cosy place.

Even if the organisers have been disappointed by the lack of famous player's names on the 2001 list of participants, the tennis level has been anyway very good and exciting for the spectators. The stadium was close to be full for the singles final played between Emilie Loit (FRA) and Petra Mandula (HUN), and people really took part in a long and tensed match in strongly applauding both players in many occasions despite the unusual warm sun brightening outside during all the week. If this very nice weather appeared as a sign of achievement for this tournament, so the 2002 edition could easily be played outdoors for sure!

CAPRIATI WAS (STILL) TOO STRONG FOR THE 18& UNDER EUROPEAN CHAMPION MARIE GAIANE MIKAELIAN

After beating Elena Dementieva and Tatiana Panova, Jennifer Capriati proved to be a bridge too far for the current 18 & Under European Champion Marie Gaiané Mikaelian. The 17 year old lost the quarterfinal of the Swisscom Challenge in Kloten to the world's number 1 player in 70 minutes, 4:6, 2:6.

Loud applause from the 5900 spectators lent support to their new darling for two sets, but in the end it was not enough. All the same, the good mood was not broken. When Mikaelian took the microphone and thanked the crowd

for their support in faltering German, she won the heart of every last fan. Without a doubt, we have witnessed the coming-of-age of a strong and popular player.

"I was a little nervous against the number 1" admitted the under-18 European champion after the match. She didn't play with as much confidence as she did against the two Russian players. In the first set, she held on to 4:4 (with one break each) before the American took the second and decisive service break. The second set went much more quickly. Breaks for Capriati at 2:1 and 5:2.

Mikaelian had a break chance at 2:2, but she wasn't able to take advantage of it. Mikaelian could have used her same routine against Capriati, who did not look impenetrable in the first set. The American said that her young opponent has "great potential" - a big compliment from a knowledgeable source.

Mikaelian was sorry that she didn't play "nearly as well" as she did against Dementieva and Panova. She further said "I can learn a lot for the future from this match against Capriati."

2001 TENNIS EUROPE SPECIFIC THEME CONFERENCE

The 2nd European Specific Theme Conference took place in the tourist resort of Otocec, Slovenia from 4-7 October 2001. Organised by Tennis Europe in conjunction with the Slovene Tennis Association, this is the second time that this high-level technical conference has been held in Slovenia, following last year's successful European Coaches Symposium.

The two day conference, funded by the ITF/Tennis Europe Development Programme, was entitled "Planning and Periodisation for Tournament Players". It dealt with the development of high performance players and featured updates on the latest research in the coaching and presentations on both junior and professional players. Eighty delegates representing 22 countries took part, and they heard 13 speakers. There were three on court and 12 off-court

presentations.

The speakers included top level coaches, and tennis experts such as Richard Schönborn (GER), Frank van Fraayenhoven (NED), Miguel Crespo (ITF Research Officer), Helmut Hauer (AUT), Anne Marie Rouchon (FRA), Frank Zlesak (CZE) and Ivo van Aken (BEL).

Helmut Hauer, who is responsible for coaches education in Austria and is a member of the Tennis Europe Development Committee said: " it was a very interesting conference, as it dealt with so many aspects of periodisation". Frank van Fraayenhoven, Director of Coaches Education for the KNLTB added: "we had a good opportunity for in-depth discussions about development of future top players and presentations included instant-to-use information

as well as more long-term challenges.

The jointly funded ITF/Tennis Europe Development Programme provided accommodation and travelling grants for a select number of European member nations to attend the conference including Yugoslavia, Latvia, Lithuania, Georgia, Estonia, Bosnia-Herzegovina, Macedonia and Malta.

Tennis Europe is already planning the next edition of the European Specific Theme Seminar that will take place in 2003. REGIONAL MEETING IN CANCUN - 12 SEPTEMBER 2001

Delegates from 22 European member nations attended the Regional Meeting in Cancun.

President Agustin Pujol took the opportunity to present the new trade mark and name of the European Tennis Association: TENNIS EUROPE and also to announce the current standing of the European Tennis Trophy with Germany leading the race, followed by France and Russia.

He reported shortly about the meeting of the ITF President with the Presidents of all Regional Associations that took place the previous day. Further he announced that the proposal for a new mem-

bership classification was being examined by the Committee of Management following the discussion at the AGM in Cyprus in March to be possibly put forward to the Tennis Europe AGM 2002.

The main purpose of this meeting being the discussion of issues on the agenda of the ITF AGM to be held the following day, the delegates discussed about the European candidatures for the ITF Board of Directors and it was finally decided to stick to the procedure agreed at the meeting in London on 1 July based on the given order of preference.

The meeting discussed as well the

amendments to the Constitution proposed by the ITF Board of Directors related to the resolution put forward by Tennis Europe with respect to membership.

ITF President Francesco Ricci Bitti and Executive Vice-President Juan Margets joined the meeting and reported about main issues such as Davis Cup, Fed Cup, Funding.

Ruurd de Boer, Chairman of the IWTF and Ellen De Lange, Manager, made as well a short presentation asking for the support of all European countries for further promoting wheelchair tennis.

TENNIS FOR SARAJEVO

Since 1992 the cities of Barcelona and Sarajevo have kept a friendly and cooperation-based relationship. It all started while the Olympic Games were held in Barcelona. By that time the ex-Yugoslavian country was going through a war which ended up lasting four years, during which Barcelona (through District 11-Sarajevo) provided the city with humanitarian aid, urban reconstruction, economic development, investment's promotion and other different social projects.

But Barcelona's cooperation commitment didn't end with the war. In 1996 the "Ambaixada de la Democracia Local", an important tool in service of the population for preventing further conflicts, started promoting several projects in order to normalize the population's lives and rebuild a peaceful and respectful environment. One of this projects is related to sports, specifically to tennis, and has been focused on the development of young Bosnian tennis players.

The initiative has been called "Tennis pro Sarajevo" and it has been promoted by the Real Club de Tennis Barcelona and its president Juan María Tintoré, in collaboration with Barcelona's Townhall, the Catalan Tennis Federation and several sport manufacturers.

So far, the Real Club de Tenis Barcelona-1899 has provided Sarajevo with mini-tennis courts, shipment of tennis material (nets, balls, racquets, learning games) and know-how to members of the

Bosnia-Herzegovina Tennis Federation.

In addition to this, 2001 has been the first year that the Open RCT Barcelona-1899-Sarajevo Tournament has been officially in the European Tennis Association (Tennis Europe) Calendar, with satisfactory results concerning the participation as well as the organization of the competition.

As the whole project has been very well received by the people in Bosnia Herzegovina, Barcelona has plans to continue serving the greatest number possible of Tennis Centres in Sarajevo, by introducing a project of indoor tennis courts, the collaboration of the Catalan Tennis Federation coaches, shipment of further material and perhaps even a tennis exhibition match.

Sarajevo might have lost its sports' facilities during the difficult war years, but for sure not its enthusiasm for Tennis!
