# <u>16 & UNDER TENNIS EUROPE WINTER CUPS BY HEAD</u> QUALIFYING GROUP ALLOCATION: POINTS SYSTEM EXPLAINED

The qualifying rounds of the Tennis Europe Winter Cups by HEAD are played in four groups, with a maximum of eight teams per group. In order to ensure a fair distribution of the teams throughout the four groups, the top sixteen nations are identified, selected and split between the groups as evenly as possible.

The top four teams (1-4) are drawn by lot into the four groups and become the top seeds of each group. This process is repeated with the teams ranked 5-8 and seeded second. Teams ranked 9-12 are drawn by lot into the four groups as the #3 seeds, and the teams ranked 13-16 are drawn by lot into the four groups as #4 seeds. In case two Nations have the same number of points, the combined ranking of the top 2 players is taken into consideration.

The distribution of the remaining countries is made by lot. Furthermore, the 9 Tennis Europe A Member Nations shall be split, as much as possible evenly between the four groups. Other relevant information shall also be taken into consideration. The Junior Committee retains the right to make discretionary adjustments if necessary in the best interests of the competition.

Countries that are organising a qualifying round shall be automatically placed in that group.

A combination of points from tables 1 and 2 below are used to decide the top sixteen nations that will comprise the seeded teams in each group:

- 1. The previous years' results of the 14&U European Summer Cups (table 1)
- 2. The latest available Tennis Europe Junior Ranking of the four best players from each participating nation (table 2)
